We're always telling children that books and reading are good for them, but have we ever really thought about why that's true? Exactly what do older children get out of reading novels? What do younger kids get from being read to? Does reading matter? Reading is an important skill that needs to be developed in children. Not only is it necessary for survival in the world of schools and (later on) universities, but in adult life as well.

The more children read, the better they become at reading. It's as simple as that. The more enjoyable the things they read are, the more they'll stick with them and develop the reading skills that they'll need for full access to information in their adult lives. Reading should be viewed as a pleasurable activity—a source of entertaining tales and useful and interesting factual information.

The more young children are read to, the greater their interest in mastering reading. When parents read aloud to children, the children also hear correct pronunciation as they see the words on the page, even if they can't yet read the words on their own.

Through books, children can also learn about people and places from other parts of the world, improving their understanding of and concern for all of humanity. This, in turn, contributes to our sense that we truly live in a "global village" and may help us bring about a more peaceful future for everyone. This can happen through nonfiction, but perhaps even more importantly, reading novels that are set in other places and time periods can give children a deeper understanding of others through identification with individual characters and their plights.

Books also give kids the opportunity to flex their critical thinking skills in areas such as problem solving, the concepts of cause and effect, conflict resolution, and accepting of responsibility for one's actions. Mysteries allow children to follow clues to their logical conclusions and to try to outguess the author. Even for very young children, a simple story with a repetitive refrain or a simple mystery to solve gives them a confidence boost. Children can predict the patterns and successfully solve the riddles.

Although reading is thought of as the quintessential solitary activity, in certain circumstances, reading can be a social activity. For example, a parent or grandparent reading a story aloud, whether from a traditional printed book or from an e-book. can be a great opportunity for adult and child to share some quiet, relaxed quality time together away from the rush and stresses of the business of daily living. At school or at a library story hour, books can bring children together and be part of a positive shared experience. For some pre-schoolers this may be their primary opportunity to socialize and learn how to behave around other children or how to sit quietly for a group activity.

It may sound funny, but e-books can be a way for children to improve their fine motor skills and their hand-eye coordination as they click around a child-friendly website or click the backward and forward buttons of online story pages. They may also be picking up valuable computer skills that they'll need in school and later in life.

If a child wants to hear the same story over and over again, don't worry about it. Children take comfort in the familiarity and predictability of a beloved story that they know by heart. There's no harm in that. Reread old favourites and, at the same time, introduce your children to new stories. Your child's mind and heart have room for both.

The basic system of Wi-Fi is very simple. In a Wi-Fi-enabled network, computers with Wi-Fi cards connect wirelessly to an access point or router. This access point or router is internet-enabled in the usual way, connected to the internet using a cable or DSL modem. Any PC or laptop with a Wi-Fi card that is within a radius of 200 feet (60 meters) from the access point can access the internet. However, a distance of 100 feet (30 meters) is considered ideal for good-quality access. An area surrounding an access point that provides wireless access is called a wireless hotspot.

A Wi-Fi-enabled work environment helps workers stay connected for longer and even interact with their co-workers effortlessly.

A wireless access point has the risk that anyone can access the information if they get within an accessible distance. Therefore, it is important to take security precautions while setting up a Wi-Fi network in your organization. The degree of security depends on the nature of the information your organization handles. If it is highly sensitive information, you will need to take customized security measures.

You can access the internet from your Wi-Fi-enabled device from wherever you are, as long as you are within range of a base station or source. Thus, the workers can move about with their gadgets from their cabin down the corridor to the conference room without losing connection. You can also access your company's network from your own laptop or PDA, even when you are in another place, like a business associate's office, a hotel, or a convention centre, as long as this place has a Wi-Fi network.

It is also faster and more cost-effective for the company to set up a wireless network than a wired connection.

The Wi-Fi technology is already commercialized, so most computing and communication gadgets like laptops and PDAs are Wi-Fi-enabled. Further, these Wi-Fi-certified gadgets are interoperable regardless of the brand.

On the other hand, public Wi-Fi access sites or hotspots are also on the rise. More and more offices, bookstores, airport lounges, and food outlets are setting up Wi-Fi hotspots in the hope that this will induce their tech-savvy customers to stay on. In some cities, entire neighbourhoods and business districts are setting up hotspots.

Wi-Fi uses radio technology for communication and mostly operates at 2.4 or 5 GHz frequencies. Most of the new connectible devices today are Wi-Fi certified, which means not only that they are Wi-Fi enabled but also that these devices are interoperable.

In a Wi-Fi network, computers with a Wi-Fi network card can connect wirelessly to a Wi-Fi router. The router is connected to the internet using a cable or DSL modem. Any Wi-Fi-enabled, connectible device within 60 meters or so of the access point can access the internet.

Some Wi-Fi hotspots are open in the sense that anyone with a connectible device within the range can access them, while others are closed, which means that only authorized users can access them using a password.

All said and done, security is one of the biggest issues with a wireless network. This is all the more relevant in the case of a plug-and-play technology like Wi-Fi. If you are not careful enough, anyone close

enough to your base station can intercept the data you send and receive from your network or break into your system.

Therefore, it is important to take sufficient security measures when you set up a Wi-Fi hotspot at your home or office. Security is also applicable when you need to access a public hotspot using your laptop or other devices.

A Wi-Fi phone is a wireless device that gives you the dual benefits of wireless connectivity and the cost savings of VoIP. It can be used in any areas—hotspots—where Wi-Fi connectivity is provided.

Just like a cell phone, you can use a Wi-Fi phone to make calls, send text messages, receive voicemail, and, to some extent, even access the internet. The Wi-Fi phone is capable of retrieving data and accessing the internet better than a cell phone.

In other words, you can use your Wi-Fi phone from home, hotels, offices, airports, internet cafes, business districts, or just about anywhere there is a Wi-Fi network established.

The problem with Wi-Fi technology is its range, and this applies to Wi-Fi phones as well. It is not possible to roam beyond the hotspot or between two hotspots, and this means limited mobility while you are on a Wi-Fi call. Further, many Wi-Fi-enabled phones shut off the Wi-Fi receptor when not in use in order to save energy. This can lead to missing incoming calls. However, we can expect that these problems will be ironed out soon as technology develops.
