

Answer the following questions in brief:

Question 1: Why was the letter written–what was the wonderful thing that had happened?

Answer: The letter was written to describe an unusual thing/event that happened on the Christmas eve at the battlefield. Both the enemies celebrated the eve in the ferocity of war. They enjoyed together with German drinks and sausage. And their carols were praised by each other. It was this

wonderful event that had happened on the battlefield.

Question 2: What jobs did Hans Wolf and Jim Macpherson have when they were not soldiers?

Answer: Jim Macpherson was a school-teacher whereas Hans Wolf used to play a cello in the orchestra.

Question 3: Had Hans Wolf ever been to Dorset? Why did he say he knew it?
