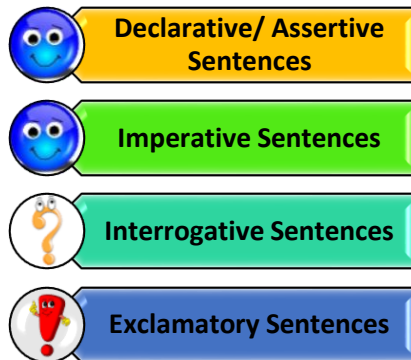
KINDS OF SENTENCES

When we speak or write we use words. We generally use these words in groups. A group of words, which makes complete sense is called a **Sentence**.



Sentences can be classified according to the purpose the sentence serves and the manner in which the thought is expressed.

Sentences can be classified as:



1. DECLARATIVE SENTENCES:

Declarative



Declarative sentences make a statement.
They use a period.

A Declarative sentence 'declares' or states a fact or an opinion. They give information and are also called Assertive sentences. A Declarative sentence ends with a period (.).

Declarative sentences can be either positive (affirmative) or negative.

Eg: He is writing his assignment.

She doesn't like cooking.

My brother started a new business.

2. IMPERATIVE SENTENCES:

Imperative



Imperative sentences make a command or request.
Use a period.

Imperative sentences are those which express commands, requests, advices, suggestions, warnings or a wish. An Imperative sentence ends with either a period (.) or an exclamation mark (!).

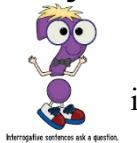
Eg: Please open the door. (a request)

Be quiet. (a command)

Have a wonderful weekend! (a wish)

3. INTERROGATIVE SENTENCES:

Interrogative



Interrogative sentences ask a question.
Do they use a question mark?

Interrogative sentences are those which ask questions, that mainly begin with interrogative words like 'What', 'Who', 'When', 'Where', 'Why', 'Which' and 'How'.

In some cases, in the interrogative form, the auxiliary verb (helping verb) precedes the subject which is then followed by the main verb (ie. Are you going...?). Interrogative sentences end with a question mark (?).

In other words, they can be further divided into 'yes/no' questions and 'wh' questions.

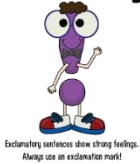
Eg: Where are you going?

How was your day?

Is Jake present in the class?

4. EXCLAMATORY SENTENCES:

Exclamatory



Exclamatory sentences are those which express sudden and strong feelings or emotions (such as surprise, wonder, pity, happiness etc.). These sentences end with an exclamation mark (!).

Eg: Bravo! We won the match!

That sounds fantastic!

Wow! That is a great idea!
