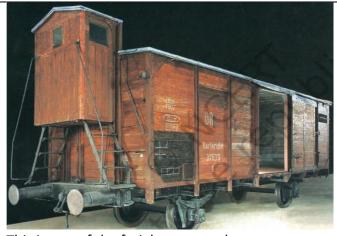

From a continent of creditors, Europe turned into one of debtors. Unfortunately, the infant Weimar Republic was being made to pay for the sins of the old empire. The republic carried the burden of war guilt and national humiliation and was financially crippled by being forced to pay compensation. Those who supported the Weimar Republic, mainly Socialists, Catholics and Democrats, became easy targets of

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attack in the conservative nationalist circles. They were mockingly called the 'November criminals'. This mindset had a major impact on the political developments of the early 1930s.

A. What were the problems faced by the Weimar Republic?

Ans:

- The Treaty of Versailles after the First World War was unfair to Germany. Germany was exploited using that treaty and due to the humiliating terms of the Treaty, the common public was discontent.
- Due to Germany being made to pay for the First World War, its economy crumbled. The price of essential goods increased substantially and also the gold reserves depleted.
- In an economic crisis, the German governments elected democratically were not able to cope up with the problems and failed to solve them Thus, the public later accepted the dictatorship of Hitler.

C. 'The Weimar constitution had some inherent defects which made it unstable and vulnerable to dictatorship'. Explain

Ans:

- One was proportional representation. This made achieving a majority by any one party a near impossible task, leading to a rule by coalitions.
- Another defect was Article 48, which gave the President the powers to impose emergency, suspend
 civil rights and rule by decree. Within its short life, the Weimar Republic saw twenty different
 cabinets lasting on an average 239 days, and a liberal use of Article 48. Yet the crisis could not be
 managed. People lost confidence in the democratic parliamentary system, which seemed to offer
 no solutions

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
