Definition of a Paragraph

A *paragraph* is a group of related sentences that focus on a single main idea or topic. It usually consists of a topic sentence, supporting details, and a concluding sentence.

Types of Paragraphs

Type	Purpose
Narrative	Tells a story or describes an event in chronological order
Descriptive	Creates a vivid picture using sensory details
Expository	Explains a concept, gives information, or teaches something
Persuasive	Convinces the reader about a specific point of view or argument
Compare & Contrast	Highlights similarities and/or differences between two ideas or items

Important Points to Remember

Unity: Stick to one main idea per paragraph.

Coherence: Ensure sentences flow logically and smoothly.

Topic Sentence: Begin with a clear sentence that introduces the paragraph's main idea.

Supporting Sentences: Add details, examples, or explanations to develop your idea.

Concluding Sentence: Wrap up or summarize your point effectively.

Transition Words: Use connectors like *however, therefore, for example*, to improve flow.

Indentation or Spacing: Begin each paragraph with an indent or space for clarity

Tips for Improving Paragraph Writing

1. Start with a Clear Topic Sentence

Begin with a sentence that clearly states the main idea.

It sets the direction for the rest of the paragraph.

2. Stay Focused

Stick to one central idea.

Avoid adding unrelated details that confuse the reader.

3. Use Logical Flow

Arrange your sentences in a natural, logical order.

Think cause-effect, problem-solution, or chronological order depending on your paragraph type.

4. Provide Strong Supporting Sentences

Use examples, facts, or explanations to develop your idea.

Try the "SEE" method: State, Explain, Example.

5. Conclude Effectively

End with a sentence that wraps up or reinforces the main point.

It should give the reader a sense of completion.

6. Use Transition Words

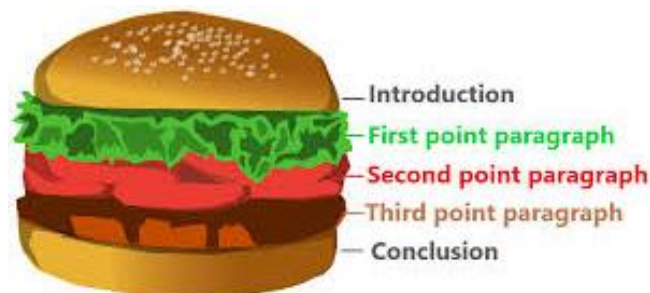
Connect your ideas using words like *first*, *however*, *for example*, *as a result*, *finally*.

This keeps your paragraph smooth and easy to follow.

7. Revise and Edit

Reread your paragraph to fix grammar, spelling, and awkward phrasing.

Make sure each sentence contributes to the main idea.



The burger is a simple and tasty metaphor for organizing a well-structured paragraph. Each part of the burger represents a key component of writing:

❖ Key Components of a Paragraph Burger

Burger Part	Paragraph Component	Purpose
Top Bun	Topic Sentence	Introduces the main idea of the paragraph
Fillings	Supporting Sentences	Provide details, examples, facts, or explanations to develop the idea
Bottom Bun	Concluding Sentence	Wraps up the paragraph and reinforces the main point
