CHARACTER SKETCH

Nicola and Jacopo are two brothers who are 13 and 12 years respectively. They belong to Verona a city in Italy. They are engaged in different works to earn money. like-selling fruits (like strawberries), polishing shoes. guiding tourists, selling newspapers etc. They are too small for doing these small works but they all do this in pursuit to earn money. They were collecting money to pay fees for their sister's treatment of tuberculosis and to make their sister well they don't even spend money on themselves (neither they wore proper clothes as they were shabbily dressed nor they ate enough food. They only ate black bread). this shows that they are too understanding and they too care for their sister. The whole story revolves around these two boys and their hard work and by seeing their matureness they are considered as Two Gentlemen of Verona.

Nicola - The Leader:

On one night, the narrator finds the boys selling newspapers. He could not stop himself from asking them why are they working so hard. Nicola tells him that there is some need but he does not elaborate. While Jacopo requests him to drop them to the village 'Polenta' in his car. The narrator being kind agrees to drop them to the village that is around 30 kilometres away. After reaching the village, the boys ask the narrator to wait for them for an hour. But, he could not resist his curiosity and follows the boys. To his surprise, the narrator finds out that the boys have gone to a hospital. In spite of being reluctant to go inside, he sees the boys talking to a girl resembling them.

He thus decides to find out what is happening from the nurse. She tells him that the girl's name is Lucia and she is their sister. Their father who was a widower was killed in a war, their home was destroyed by a bomb and they were left to starve. The boys hated the Germans as they came to rule the village and also joined the resistance movement against them. After the war ended, Lucia got ill with Tuberculosis. They thus had to admit her to the hospital. Hence, they work hard in order to pay for all the hospital bills.

The story ends with the narrator waiting outside the hospital room and saying nothing so as to not give them the impression that he knew their secret. The story teaches us the virtues of honesty, sincerity, courage, determination, and sacrifice that are vital to the existence of humanity.

- Nicola and Jacopo lived a comfortable and cultured life with their father and elder sister.
- Their widower father was a well-known singer and was killed in the war against Germany.
- During the war, a bomb blast made them homeless and they were left in the streets with their only elder sister Lucia.
- The children had a tough time reestablishing their house and when they heard about the Resistance movement, they secretly joined the same, leaving their sister behind.
- After the war, they returned home and found that their sister suffering from tuberculosis of the spine.

- They did not give up. They decided to admit their sister in a nursing home and take care of her in every possible way.
