You will be surprised to discover that it is calm, and there are almost no thoughts in your mind. Since the mind is not accustomed to stay in this peaceful state for long, it soon becomes active again, and the sense of happiness disappears.

- 1 According to a new study, a vast blanket of pollution stretching across South Asia is cutting down sunlight by 10 per cent over India, damaging agriculture, modifying rainfall patterns and putting hundreds of thousands of people at risk. The findings, by scientists working with the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP), indicate that the spectacular economic growth seen in this part of the world in the past decade may soon falter as a result of the "Asian Brown Haze". Vital follow up studies are needed to unravel the precise role this three-kilometre-deep pollution blanket may be having on the region's climate and the worlds.
- 2. It is said. "Acids in the haze may, by falling as acid rain, have the potential to damage crops and trees. Ash falling on leaves can aggravate the impact of reduced sunlight o the Earth's surface. The pollution that is forming the haze could be leading to sever hundreds of thousands of premature deaths as a result of higher levels of respiratory diseases."
- 3. Studies indicate that the level of fatalities is rising along with the levels of pollution. Results from seven cities in India alone, including Ahmedabad, Kolkata, Delhi and Mumbai, estimate that some kinds of air pollution were annually responsible for 24,000 in the early 1990s. By the mid-1990s they resulted in an estimated 37,000 premature fatalities.
- 4. "The haze has cut down sunlight over India by 10 percent (so far) a huge amount. As a repercussion, the North-West of India is drying up." Prof. V. Ramanathan said when asked specifically about the impact of the haze over India. He said, "We are in an early stage of understanding of the impact of the haze,"
- 5. Prof. V. Ramanathan was asked whether the current droughts in most parts of India after over a decade of good monsoons was owning to the haze. He said, "It was t (early to reach a conclusion. If the droughts persist for about four to five years, then would start suspecting that it may because of the haze." 


