WORD BANK



- 1. **Wind whipped-** refers to something that has been forcefully affected or shaped by the movement or force of the wind.
- 2. **Drift** (here) be carried slowly by a current of air or water









MOVEMENT WORDS:

- Glide: A smooth, continuous motion, often slow and graceful, as if moving effortlessly through air or water.
- **Dive:** A rapid, downward movement, often sudden and intentional, typically associated with plunging or descending.
- Soar: An upward, high-flying movement, often sustained and seemingly effortless, associated with height and freedom.
- Swoop: A swift, often sudden movement downward and then upward, typically in a curved path.
- Circle: A motion that involves moving around a central point in a steady, continuous path, creating a round.

II Answer the following questions:

(a) How does the poet describe the kites in the first two lines?

- ➤ Line 2: Two words (Adjectives describing the title)
- ➤ **Line 3:** Three words (Action verbs related to the title)
- ➤ Line 4: Four words (A phrase or sentence expressing a feeling or effect related to the title)
- ➤ **Line 5:** One word (Synonym or summary of the title)
